Early Intervention Hearing Services

Children who are born with normal hearing learn to listen and understand speech incidentally though overhearing and meaningful interactions. We actually hear with our brain and EI hearing services are all about brain development. When a young child is deaf or hard of hearing they have great difficulty overhearing and therefore their caregivers need to know how to make the most out of their opportunities to learn to communicate. EIHS offers help in providing families with education about their child's hearing levels and what they can hear at home as well as understand their child's hearing technology, how to troubleshoot the technology and ways to keep it on their tiny ears. Outcomes are better when families and their young children receive EI services from a specialized provider with expertise in working with families and their young children who are deaf or hard of hearing (JCIH 2013). There are other ways the EIHS provider can also help families:

Develop an understanding about hearing loss and what it means to be deaf or hard or hearing, Learn strategies for promoting language, listening, and learning in everyday routines. Learn ways to turn simple routines (diapering, feeding) into opportunities for simulating language growth.

- Help Increase confidence in parenting a child who is DHH.
- Help families learn to identify strengths and build on them,
- Give families Unbiased information on communication modalities and help support their choices.
- Collaborate with child's audiologists and clinical speech therapists helping families take what they learn and apply it at home.
- Provide On-going monitoring of listening and language development through regular specialized assessment practices
- Help Support daycare professionals who wish to learn how to best meet the needs of the child who is deaf or hard of hearing
- Assist with toddler transition to preschool services

It is known Hearing loss can affect a child's ability to develop speech,

language, and social skills. The CDC explains: "The earlier a child who is deaf or hard-of-hearing starts getting services, the more likely the child's speech, language, and social skills will reach their full potential. Early intervention program services help families who have young children with hearing loss learn language skills and other important skills. Research shows that early intervention services can greatly improve a child's development. Babies that are diagnosed with hearing loss should begin to get intervention services as soon as possible, but no later than 6 months of age. Without extra help, children with hearing loss have problems learning language. These children can then be at risk for other delays. Families who have children with hearing loss often need to change their communication habits or learn special skills to help their children learn language. These skills can be used together with hearing aids, cochlear or auditory brainstem implants, and other devices that help children hear." EIHS is contracted by DODD to provide family training and counseling to families of children with hearing loss.



## What are Transferable Skills?

Transferable skills are skills and abilities that are relevant and helpful across different areas of life: socially, professionally and at school. They are 'portable skills'.

People usually think about their transferable skills when applying for a job or when thinking about a career change. Employers often look for people who can demonstrate a good set of transferable skills.

The good news is that you already have transferable skills – you've developed such skills and abilities throughout your life, at school and perhaps at university, at home and in your social life, as well as through any experience in the work-place.

Some examples of transferable skills are: team work, leadership, personal motivation, organization, time management, adaptability, listening, written and verbal communication among others.




