2020-21 Bowling

Special Olympics has battled to get back live. We have jumped through every hoop that the State Office put in our way. Here is what we have been doing with bowling.

We did a restart in late March. We got everyone to sign a Covid Release form, we do temperature checks daily, Covid check sheet and then kept the groups to 10 or less. To make this work, we had a 3:00 and 4:00 groups on Monday and Tuesday, then a 3:30 group on Wednesday. We could've had a 3:30 group on Thursday, but it was not needed. We keep 2 to a lane (unless it is individuals that live together) and use every other lane. We sanitize bowling balls after use.

We now have 3:00 and 4:00 groups on Tuesday only. We continue to keep 2 to a lane (unless it is individuals that live together) and use every other lane. We are hoping to back to our regular bowling group soon. That is up to Special Olympics Ohio.

Overall, we probably have 80% of the people that usually come. The one group that we have not gotten completely back are the school age kids. They were transported right after school and the schools this year can't transport them. Some parents have had a difficult time finding a way to get their kids to bowling, so have not gotten back at this point.

Jr. Adult League

Here is a story that will touch your heart! We recently helped a group of our athletes get started in League Bowling on Thursday nights at River City. It is called a Jr. Adult League and what this means is, the team of 3 can have 2 adults and 1 person under the age of 18 on it. They bowl Thursday nights at 7:00.

Our Team is made up of Skylar Miller, Jacob Heath and Tim Blanton. They have been bowling lights out!! They currently are tied for first place in the league. There are 23 teams. Not bad! We look to get other teams set up in the future.

Young Athletes

We recently completed our first session of 2021 of Young Athletes. Young Athletes is a program through Special Olympics specifically for ages 3-7. There is no requirement regarding having a developmental disability to join. What happens is, we have a very inclusive group of kids each week. Who knows if anyone has a developmental disability.

We have been involved with Young Athletes for 8 or 9 years (probably longer, as my memory is bad). It has been a one-hour session.

The sessions are set up with a sports theme, but we do everything in a play-based setting. If a ball is used, everyone gets to choose a ball. Instructions are kept brief and simple, drills are built in as part of the play time. We do the main activity, then stop about 15 minutes from the end to sing some songs.

To make Young Athletes work this year, we had to do 9:00, 10:00 and 11:00 groups. We had 37 kids participate. It is held Saturday mornings and this first session we had to do in the Activity Center at HOPE. We held it 5 consecutive weeks. It worked out pretty well, as we were able to get outside for some of it.

Oh yeah, we had a pre-packaged snack available as you left.

We look forward to doing a summer session back at the Filling Home.



Early Intervention

Thea is a very active and busy (almost) three year old! Thea graduated from the HOPE Services Early Intervention program on her third birthday the end of May. Thea and her family have been receiving coaching from one of HOPE's Developmental Specialist bi-weekly and a burst of coaching services monthly from HOPE's Occupational Therapist. Thea has only ever received virtual visits and virtual services from HOPE due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, but Thea is sure thriving. Thea was one of the first new families enrolled when the pandemic began; it was fun for the team and family to learn together. Although the Early Intervention Team is sad to see Thea go, they are so excited to watch her continue to grow and learn. Thea and her family have really enjoyed their time in EI; they are so thankful for the wonderful team to help Thea grow and learn, and are looking forward to Thea starting Preschool in the fall thanks to their EI team.

Here is Thea playing with some of her Sensory Equipment. Thea will use these items to help calm her when she is upset and to give her something positive she can do while she is bored.
