Elijah is using at least 3-4 word phrases to tell his parents what he wants to eat and what activities he would like to do. At times parents have difficulty understanding Elijah, so they are using suggestions that the EI staff have given them so Elijah says words more clearly. Elijah turned three in February and is looking forward to preschool. It has been a pleasure working with Elijah, watching him grow and learn new things.

Hello restaurant lovers! I would like to share a fun place to celebrate St. Patrick's Day. It's also a great place to eat before Walleye games, Mud Hens games, or any event happening in downtown Toledo. My restaurant review for March is...

THE BLARNEY IRISH PUB!

Last Saturday, I had dinner with my parents at The Blarney. It is located across the street from the Mud Hens stadium at 601 Monroe Street. They have a big menu of both Irish and American favorites, including burgers, sandwiches, wraps, salads, soups, entrees, and desserts. They also have a kid's menu.

We started our meal with the Shamrock Sampler. My favorite appetizer on the sampler was the Reuben Egg Roll. They come with thousand island dipping sauce that tastes really good. The Reuben Egg Rolls were tender, juicy, flavorful and delicious. They are crispy on the outside and that is my favorite part. For my dinner I got the Irish Dip sandwich. The fresh baked hoagie bun was filled with tender corned beef, caramelized onions, melted Swiss cheese, and garlic chipotle mayo. It came with corned beef broth for dipping. The meat was juicy, tender and flavorful! It melted in my mouth! My sandwich was five stars!

My Dad ordered the Classic Celtic Reuben. It came on toasted marble rye bread. My Dad thought it needed more sauerkraut, so he gave it 4.5 stars. My Mom chose the Guinness BBQ chicken wrap. She loved this wonderful wrap filled with crispy chicken, tangy BBQ sauce, bacon, cheese, and lettuce. The hand cut fries were phenomenal, and the perfect side to the wrap. My Mom rated it five stars and would order it again. She added a little drizzle of ranch to make it extra tasty!

Next time I go to the Blarney, I might try the Shepherd's Pie, or The Blarney's Famous Fish and Chips! I know I will go back for more great food and fun times!



For the month of March, I have chosen to write about cerebral palsy. I looked up the history of this birth defect and found it interesting that the first documented history dates back to the 1860's, when an English surgeon named William Little came across a puzzling condition. He wrote the first medical descriptions, detailing that it caused stiff, spastic muscles in the legs, as well as slightly in the arms of the individual. What was originally named Little's disease is now known as spastic diplegia cerebral palsy. According to cerebral palsysource.com, it is caused when the brain damage occurs in the outer layer of the brain, the cerebral cortex. Spastic cerebral palsy is the most common form and affects 70 to 80 percent of patients. The symptoms include increased tone, or tension, in a muscle. Normal muscles work in pairs, but due to complications in brain-to-muscle communication, the normal degree of muscle tension is disrupted and effective movement is blocked. Today, spastic cerebral palsy is grouped along with other defects due to developmental brain injury, known as cerebral palsy.

Little didn't have much evidence as to the cause. He found that most children were born following premature or complicated deliveries and reasoned that extended time in the birth canal resulted in a lack of oxygen, causing their condition and that this oxygen shortage damaged sensitive brain tissue responsible for controlling movement.

It wasn't until 1897 that Little's theory would be challenged. Sigmund Freud, world famous psychiatrist, disagreed, saying that children with cerebral palsy were subject to other problems, such as mental retardation, visual disturbances and seizures. Freud believed that the condition might stem back earlier in life, during the brain's development in the womb. Freud suggested that a difficult birth was merely a symptom of deeper issues that influence fetal development.
