




HOPE Services provides or funds supports for approximately 400 people in Henry county, currently ages three months to 87 years.

Individual Employment Services encourages individuals with disabilities to access and succeed in employment in a community setting. HOPE Services currently has 75 individuals competitively employed in the community.




By partnering with agency and private providers, HOPE Services is committed to creating living situations that are successful in meeting individuals' current needs and helping them achieve their future goals.



Early Intervention

Early Intervention Services are provided at no cost to families that live in Henry County who have infants and toddlers from birth up until their third birthday. These little ones have diagnosed medical conditions (such as prematurity, syndromes, hearing or vision concerns, autism, etc) or who have a delay in development (in the areas of motor skills, problem solving skills, social skills, communication, or self help skills). Delays are determined by parent interviews, observations and evaluations completed by the Early Intervention Staff.

Anyone can refer a child to Early Intervention. The number for referring a child is: 1-800-755-4769. This is a voluntary program and parents need to be aware that they are being referred.

If a child is determined to have delays, they are eligible for services provided by a Developmental Specialist, Occupational Therapist, Speech Therapist, Physical Therapist, Mental Health Consultant and Vision and Hearing Consultant. The Early Intervention Team uses a Primary Service Provider Model, meaning that the staff member most qualified to meet the child's and families' areas of concern will be the one that provides services to the family. Other team members are always available to consult.


Early Intervention Service Coordinators are responsible for all referrals and gathering information from caretakers and families, monitoring services and assisting in providing resources and referrals to other agencies.

All Early Intervention staff understand that young children learn through activities they enjoy and have interests in with the people that are familiar to them. Early Intervention takes place in the child's home, daycare settings, or other places that the child spends their day. Activities are developed with the adults in these settings that encourage the development of skills and can be provided throughout the child's daily routine. The adults meet with Early Intervention Staff to develop goals/outcomes that are important to the family. The PSP supports family members and caregivers in this process and model, coach and teach them how to implement them.

By providing information, activities and strategies, supports and resources, young children's learning is enhanced and parents are able to strengthen parenting competence and confidence.

Early Intervention also offers monthly Playgroups that allow children to be with others their age, families to meet each other and have fun learning and trying new things.

In April, we celebrate Autism Acceptance Month. During this time, we spread understanding, acceptance, and support for the autism community. Let's recognize the contributions of people on the autism spectrum and their families, and work towards creating a world where everyone in the autism community is connected to the support they need.

Autism

Autism, or Autism spectrum disorder, refers to a broad range of conditions characterized by challenges with social skills, repetitive behaviors, speech and nonverbal communication. It is estimated by the CDC that Autism affects 1 in 36 children and 1 in 45 adults today.

Each person with Autism has a different set of strengths and challenges. Some autistic people can speak with others are nonverbal or minimally verbal and communicate in other ways. Some have intellectual disabilities, while others do not. Some require significant support in their daily lives, while others do not, and in some cases, others live entirely independent.

Autism is diagnosed around age 5 in the US, with signs appearing at age 2 or 3. Many people with autism can experience other medical, behavioral or mental health issues that affect their quality of life.

Among the most common occurring conditions are:

- *Attention-deficit-hyperactive-disorder (ADHD)
- *Anxiety and depression
- *Gastrointestinal disorders
- *Seizures and sleep disorders


