
Family Regulation Kits

Mental health concerns continue to impact our community and many families struggle with gaining access to mental health



services. In an effort to provide education and tools that are easy and fun to use the Northwest Ohio Trauma Informed Care Collaborative (NWOTICC) has purchased Family Regulation Kits. These kits promote families talking and supporting one another. The Activities can be used for all ages of children. The kits are play-based and help families see and experience the powerful change that can happen through play. Through play families can create happy and joyous family times. Play can increase closeness and positive feelings. The kit contains 4 "mystery" envelopes. Each envelope provides a prompt for each individual to check in with one another on how they are feeling that day, coping skills strategy, and a prop with suggested activities. The props are a magnifying glass, a feather, a die/dice, and index cards. Opening one kit per week provides a family an opportunity to experience positive and fun relationships with one another. Studies have shown it takes approximately 400 repetitions to create a new synapse in the brain UNLESS it is done with PLAY. With play it takes between 10 – 20 repetitions. If you are interested in trying out these activities contact your child's SSA to request a kit.

Hola, Amigos! It's time to celebrate Cinco de Mayo. This month I'm going to share my top five Mexican restaurants. It's too hard to narrow it down to one, so here are some great choices for delicious Mexican food!

- La Jaliscience, Defiance, Ohio. I like the dip sampler. The dips include bean dip, carne con queso, chorizo queso, guacamole. They have the best fruity drinks called Agua frescas. My favorites are the Pina (pineapple) and the Tropical (mango orange pineapple).
- Azul Tequila, Napoleon. One of my favorite menu items is the Enchilada Bandera- the three sauces are made to look like the Mexican flag.
- 3. Te'kela, Perrysburg. They have amazing street tacos. I like the El pastor and the Korean BBQ. According to my Dad, they have the best margaritas in the area.
- 4. El Vaquero, Toledo, at the Docks. My favorite dish is the Shrimp Enchiladas filled with beans and topped with grilled shrimp and covered with cheese sauce.



ALS

Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis is a progressive neurological disorder that damages nerve cells, causing disability. This condition is known as Lou Geriq's disease, after the New York Yankee's baseball player who was diagnosed with the disorder in the late 1930's. ALS damages motor neurons, the nerve cells that control voluntary movements, causing them to shrink and die. ALS is caused by the progressive dysfunction and death of nerves that send messages from the brain to the spinal cord and those that run through the spinal cord and connect to the muscles.



ALS runs in families because disease-associated mutations are passed from parents to their children.



Every week, we meet at the Filling Home Gym on Saturdays from 10 to 11 a.m. In the spirit of inclusion, this program is open to all children ages 2 to 7. There is no cost to participate. Each session includes free play and exploration on our obstacle course, learning how to work together, and very early sports skills, and we finish each session with song and dance.
